Ensuring Inclusion: Key to Achieve Learning Outcomes

Let me start by Congratulating the Department of Special Education, SNDT Women's University for initiating this sixmonthly newsletter from September 2018 on the Teachers' Day. Keeping with the spirit and occasion; my humble effort is to reinstate in teachers the confidence that she/he is the most important person in every child's life and alone has the master key to lay the foundations of learning; the lifelong companion of each of us. It also gives me an opportunity to express my gratitude to all my teachers especially Prof. M. B. Buch of M S University of Baroda for making me a lifelong learner and guiding me.

This brings me to an important issue: What do we expect from our learners: Learning Outputs or Learning Outcomes? Do ask yourself as all now need to look at these terms in the context of MHRD's notification on the issue. It has important implications for each teacher and teacher educator especially those who are keen to ensure inclusion. Ensuring is what I will say is OUTCOME and is different from OUTPUT.

- Learning Output in a way is the impact created by the processes such as how we decide and implement curriculum and assess.
- Learning Outcomes should be What Difference has been made to the individual; does he/she feel happy of what has been gained; can he/she build further on this and so on.

It is important to understand this difference and to ensure that each child has an opportunity to discover himself/ herself and education is an enabling process.

It is a known fact that much pedagogy has evolved from efforts to make an individual learn and in initial stages it was what today is referred to Individual Education Plan (IEP); mostly used in the context of special support services be it education, rehabilitation, skill development and so on. Now the service provider diagnoses the capability of the

learner; his/ her style, maturation, opportunities etc. and sets a target. Then learning process is facilitated, progress reviewed, reset the target and ensure that milestones are achieved.

Please remember, our role as teacher/ teacher educator is not to diagnose and label students. As combination/ pattern and persistence of many conditions can imply so many disabling and health challenges and at times some of these may also be due to school/institution, age related or family related factors. Our commitment should lead to first what we can do with our own initiative and resources followed by consultation with fellow teachers, family and if need be referral to specialists.

Today, Right to Education Act (RTE 2009) and Rights of Persons with Disability Act (RPWD, 2016) provides a framework for facilitating us to do our duty.

Please do remember when addressing these needs; it is not necessarily in one to one individualized action rather All Students Benefit as we teacher educators and teachers in the process start Planning, Generating Resources and Using Multi-Sensory Approaches.

Tribute To My Teacher

Oh, it was then - way back in mid-80's that I recount.

An attempt was made to train a bunch of about 20 graduates from different fields, into refined teachers for children with special needs. Imagine the task at hand for our teacher-the teeny weeny tiny figure! It was multi-category training then. In one academic year, her task was to train us all to educate children with MR, CP, and LD almost single-handedly!

What a powerhouse of a teacher we had. A strict disciplinarian with a "no-nonsense' attitude, who entertained no excuses whatsoever when it came to work. There she would be seated behind her table her tiny figure much before time and her sharp eyes all over. "Impossible", we would murmur to ourselves "to cross the watchtower that is her office", for no bunking classes was tolerated.

If busy in a meeting, she made sure we had enough assignments to submit so not a single second of the training programme was missed. "She has her spies all over the town", we grumbled. Any person even distantly connected to special education would be planted in our class to share his/her knowledge and experience. "Learn, learn and learn" was her operating motto.

"Oh friends watch what we are doing" we said to each other, "she will emerge from anywhere" to ascertain we wasted no time doing hanky panky things. She even checked on us at our library period and heaven save us if we were caught doing wrong things! Little did we realize her sublime intention then. She tried to ensure that not a single moment of our precious training period was wasted.

Arushi, then called 'Learning Centre' was her brainchild. The most challenging kids were admitted. She sat with us, with the child, to train, demonstrate and also to learn. The teacher and the taught learning together, for training at the grass root level was her focus. She was unafraid and never shied away from learning.

Now, almost 33 years later we realize how lucky we were to have her as our Teacher. She wove into our being work ethic at its highest. Today, I fall at the feet of my teacher in all humility - what was then fear is now awe and to her I owe all that I have learnt and practiced over the years.

Yes, Yashuben, that was you, our dear Teacher, the founder of what is now DSE and the one I hold in highest reverence and affection in my heart.

My humble appeal to all you teachers of the department today is to take forward my Teacher's legacy! Exuberate totally unconditional and unwavering commitment and accountability to your duty as she does even today at NASEOH and try to instill the same in your students.

And my dear students respect time; respect the child; observe his or her strengths and weaknesses; never enter a class without a plan; always have plan B ready; never ever hurt a parent. Monetary considerations should not be the only goal. Wish the department to achieve many more milestones and influence many more lives.
