


Gender Disparity in India

Gender disparity signifies differences in women's and men's access to education, health services, mobility, freedom, autonomy, employment, decision making and resources to lead a dignified life. It is an indicator of socio-economic-culturallegal and political status as well as physical and mental well-being. Gender usually favour men and are often institutionalised through law, justice and social norms. Indian women and transgender community still face gender discrimination in education, child marriage and pregnancy, sexual violence and unrecognized domestic work. Census 2011 shows the child sex ratio among children of 0-6 years to be 918 girls for every 1000 boys in India. Pre-birth elimination of daughters is aided by new reproductive technologies. Gender disparity is a pressing issue in Indian society in 5 crucial areas- Health, Education, Employment, Safe and dignified life and decision making in private and public life. Even in the pyramid of poverty, women are at the bottom-the poorest among the poor. Girls are not encouraged to opt for Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics(STEM) subjects. Work participation of women in the gainful employment is abysmally low, currently 9 % as per the CMIE data. Among the working women, 92% are in the informal sector doing dead-end jobs.

Gender disparity has a profound effect on mental health worldwide. Some of the psychological effects of gender disparity include higher levels of stress, anxiety, depression, and posttraumatic stress disorder (PTSD) in women and people of marginalized genders. With the prevalence of gender discrimination, and social norms and practices, girls become exposed to the possibility of child marriage, teenage pregnancy, child domestic work, poor education and health, sexual abuse, exploitation and violence. Many of these manifestations will not change unless girls are valued more. With improper education due to gender disparity, there has been disruption in the economic status of women. There is also less political participation of women. Women in politics are likely to bring welfare issues such as violence against women, childcare, and maternal health into consideration.

Changing the gender norms through progressive legislations and their judicious implementation, ensuring safety of girls and women in the family, community, schools and colleges and at the workplace, making content of education gender sensitive, raising aspiration of girls and mothers, recognition of 'unpaid care work' and decent wages for paid care-work are most important to address gender equality concerns. Gender equality has been proved to be the central driver of economic growth and human development. Improving gender balance is an important step for India's development and its achievement of greater economic growth and gender equality.



When Barriers Became Enablers

Friends, we hear, read about several pathetic stories of exploitation, disadvantageous conditions of persons with disabilities in general and women in particular. These stories do make us sad and reflect for a while about them and then we leave them aside, thinking it is not in our hand. These stories point at several well-known barriers coming in their way namely, inadequate familial context, negative societal attitude, inaccessible education/ training and nonsupportive work environment etc. But what if these barriers become enablers? This is what actually happened in my modest life.

Friends, I come from a very ordinary familial context when a single earning member(father) has visually impaired children having a deadly eye disease called "Retinitis Pigmentosa" which had already decided our dark future. But my father who was the embodiment of courage and strength taught us to dare to dream and took us to Moscow (in then USSR) for an experimental treatment which afterward proved to be unfruitful. But this visit changed our lives 360 degree. It gave us a new vision of knowledge and a rare opportunity to get higher education in an inclusive environment in a very dignified manner . This is how I could get education up to Ph.D. level.

Our stay in Russia gave us confidence and strength to lead our life meaningfully.

My search for the job started and and ended with K.J. Somaiya College of Education. Here the principal Dr M.N.Deshmukh and the management believed in my abilities rather than in my disability. As a result I became a contributory member of the institution and not a recipient of any philanthropic favour. The colleagues who were initially little apprehensive about my appointment also became collaborative. The most inclusive were my students who always thought that I actually do not have any disability.

All this helped me to climb the ladder of success and reach a decent professional graph. I became vice principal of the college from 2006 to 2019 and a Ph.D. guide of Mumbai and Somaiya Vidyavihar Universities. This journey may be an usual path for any academician, but for me it was an achievement. My humble contribution to the field of education and special education gave me some social recognition and few awards. My father had tears in his eyes when he saw me receiving a national role model award by the hands of President Shri. Pranav Mukharjee. This story may not perhaps be all pervasive but at

least may light corners of minds of few and give power to dare to dream for a bright future.

Voicescapes

Voice is the most basic and yet the most powerful tool for a teacher. Voice modulation is a delicate skill that teachers can keep in their arsenal, to use as per the needs of each classroom. When used effectively, voice has the power to make an indelible impression on a child's mind. 'Voicescapes' was a workshop conducted by Ms Savita Vishwanathan on May 7, 2022, who taught techniques to modulate, enunciate and intonate voice to transform it into a valuable teaching tool.



Arts Based Therapy







Arts Based Therapy (ABT) uses the medium of arts to help people explore their thoughts and emotions and channelize them to communicate and express. Ms Vanashree Ghate, the resource person for this workshop, on May 13, 2022, gave a good overview on how to conduct an ABT session and the benefits of ABT as an intervention tool for dealing with persons with special needs. She also dwelt upon the spell a good story can cast on children to help them develop creative expression.

The Empower Project

The importance of self-advocacy is a well-known matter in the field of disability, but oftentimes, talking about it is easier than actually implementing it. We as special educators teach our students to be self-reliant, but teaching our students about their rights is also imperative. Apps, Robotics and Teaching Learning Materials








Drama for Inclusion

Pedagogical Approaches at Arushi – The Learning

"What exhausts us is not making use of the possibilities of our organs and senses, their subjugation and suppression. What constitutes them is development...development through the engagement with a world that wholly challenges us." (Hugo Kukelhaus)

The above quote summarizes the main idea behind Hugo Kukelhaus' work. Hugo Kukelhaus was a German carpenter, writer, philosopher, pedagogue and artist, who designed the concept of 'Field of Experiences' for the development of the senses. This field comprises the use of various multi-sensory toys that stimulate the child through texture, sound, smell, color and maybe even taste. Multi-sensory approach to learning generates curiosity in the students because of the concrete accessibility that the students experience. Hugo Kukelhaus said that in a bid to become more technologically sound, humans have started ignoring the fundamental experiences and basic instincts that they are born with. At Arushi – The Learning Center equipment like texture mats, sand trays, sound boxes, and color tiles are used to stimulate the children's senses. It helps the children to develop a variety of skills like gross motor skills, eye-hand coordination, full body balance, social skills, etc.

Arushi also has a huge open classroom that is a safe space for all students to enter. It borrows from the Reggio-Emilia method, a value-centered approach that focuses on making school environment conducive for children to explore and express. Schools that follow this approach are often vibrant, dedicated, innovative, transparent in communication and documentation, and these schools are leaders in research, new learning and self-reflection. At Arushi one could find that every day is a new one, as the structure of the classroom changes according to the needs of the class on that day.

This brings variety and fluidity to the children's learning. The various stakeholders participate equally in the children's learning which also helps the stakeholders feel welcome and motivated. At Arushi the students are encouraged to use multiple ways to explore their surroundings. The exploration helps the teacher in understanding what the child is trying to express.

The big, open areas and windows in Arushi allow transparency, nature, experimentation, art, language and much more to flourish in the classroom creating an environment of safe learning and continuous development.

The combination of both these pedagogies support and optimize the development of the students at Arushi – The Learning Centre, making it a happy and stress free place to learn and grow.
