The yearly campus placement of the department saw many educational institutes come and select our students for their organizations without breaking the 100% campus placement record of DSE. A national event of significance conducted

was a 15-day offline Multidisciplinary Course on the theme, 'NEP 2020: A Pathway to Inclusion in Higher Education.' sponsored by UGC Malviya Mission Teacher Training Centre under RUSA. We were honoured by the benign presence of Former Secretary of UGC, Hon'ble Vice Chancellor of GNDU, Amritsar, Dr Jaspal Singh Sandhu as the Chief Guest and the Keynote speaker and Hon'ble Vice Chancellor Prof. Ujwala Chakradeo, SNDTWU who presided the inaugural ceremony. The valedictory ceremony was graced by the former Vice Chancellor of NIEPA, a distinguished academician Prof. B. G. Tilak. The Director HRDC Mumbai University, Prof. Vidhya Venkatecan was appreciative of the Department for the successful conduct of the refresher course on the theme which is the corner stone of NEP 2020.

Several programmes were organized for the continuous skill enhancement of our existing students. Our alumnae conducted workshops on leadership, creative thinking, math skills, phonics etc. thus providing hands on training to our students.

Responding to the needs of changing times, DSE continuously evolves it's programmes. First batch of Advanced Certificate Course in Inclusion and Inclusive Practices in collaboration with St. Xavier's College of Education has started with 23 pre-service teachers enrolled in the course. The 8th batch of Shadow Teaching Certificate Course with 24 participants is also being offered by the department.

We are very excited to organize the most anticipated event of DSE, the 3rd International Conference on Education (ICE3), on the theme, 'Embracing Diversity: The Intersectional Experience'

in collaboration with Jai Vakeel Foundation on January 9-11, 2025. The keynote speaker of ICE3 is Prof. Richard Rose, Emeritus Professor University of Northampton and the Guest of Honour is the Vice Chancellor of Ibn Zohr University, Morocco.

Hon'ble Vice Chancellor of SNDTWU Prof. Ujwala Chakradeo will preside over the inauguration of ICE3.

There are more than 20 renowned international speakers from different parts of the world and more than 35 distinguished national speakers engaging in pre-conference workshops, didactic sessions, panel discussions, and fireside chats. We have 250 registrations and more are pouring in. There are 60 paper presentations to encourage young researchers to share their work on this international platform. We are proud of our student ambassadors, involved in ICE3 and are learning various skills of management and leadership.

Arushi-The Learning centre is expanding and the children are benefiting from various initiatives being taken by the teachers. An inclusive Independence Day celebration saw the participation of very reputed mainstream schools like Jamnabai Narsee School and Billabong High International School, where all children got the message of inclusivity and supporting diversities. The teachers of Arushi are getting trained in 'ReadON - A Cognitive Therapy Programme'.

It was a sad moment for DSE to lose its founding Director Dr Yashuben Mehta (94 Years old) who dedicated her life for the betterment of children with disabilities and their families till her last breath. She inspired generations of students and professionals with her passion and selfless service in the disability sector. We salute her and strive to take her legacy forward.

Gender Diversity

"Increasing the proportion of women in public institutions makes them more representative, increases innovation, improves decision-making and benefits whole societies." - António Guterres, United Nations Secretary-General, International Women's Day, 8-3-2017. Gender diversity is understood as

proportion of girls/women/transpersons to boys/men in the institutional structures. policies, systems of educational institutions, industry/corporates, criminal justice system, governance and political decision making bodies. Practices of gender diversity ensure equitable representation of people across gender spectrum. This also includes people of non-binary genders. Different genders behave differently. Girls/women are believed to be more intuitive in decision. making, have the ability to multi-task, and are better at building relationships. Bov/men tend to be more task focused and make decisions based on information and procedures. Gender minorities face discrimination, stigmatisation and exclusion, hence they need affirmative action by the community, state and nonstate stake holders in terms of quota, social security, social safety, legal protection and financial support. Gender equality is of fundamental importance, and that investing in the empowerment of all genders, has a multiplier effect in implementing the Sustainable Development Goals, 2030 Agenda. By enhancing economic and social empowerment of women and persons with intersectional vulnerabilities resulting multiple marginalities, intervention strategies informed by gender diversity encourage human development and remain committed to enhancing a full, equal, effective, and meaningful participation as decision makers for addressing global challenges inclusively. All those who have faced discrimination due to their socio-cultural locations determined by caste/ class/ disability/ age/ language/ geographical location and gender are mainstreamed in contributing as active participants in all spheres of society, across all sectors and at all levels of the economy. Gender diversity is not a zero-sum game, it is a win-won formula as it has a multiplier effect. Acknowledging, respecting and celebrating gender identity is crucial in creating an inclusive workplace. A truly diverse environment not only facilitates equal representation of various genders but also promotes ethos of non-discrimination and safe space for unleashing a creative potential for collective wisdom. It widens the scope for including diverse perspectives, collaborative work culture resulting in greater innovations and harmony in interpersonal dynamics.

Prioritising gender diversity within the ecosystem by full, equal, effective, and meaningful participation of all genders as decision makers for addressing local and global challenges inclusively and in contributing as active participants in all spheres of society, across all sectors and at all levels of the economy. That 'diversity of views' fuelled by that gender diversity is a powerful driver for success. Gender diversity in leadership has great benefits because when girls/women or historically marginalised genders take leadership roles. they inspire other women, girls and historically excluded citizens to pursue leadership roles. Diverse teams are often more productive because they bring with them diverse abilities and experiences engage in focused collaboration that produces better intervention strategies and outcomes. Gender diversity in decision making results in all voices being respected and valued and enthuses them to be proactive and highly motivated to work with the team members.

An IDEA Whose Time has Come!

Embracing diversity is more than just a noble ideal - it's a journey of recognizing the beautiful complexities that make up who we are as individuals and as a collective society. To me, diversity and inclusion go far beyond just being buzzwords or concepts limited to particular groups. As a special educator for over three decades, I have come to see diversity in its broadest sense - it's the tapestry of different experiences, abilities, cultures, and perspectives that make us unique. A disability, for me, is just another facet of this beautiful tapestry of diversity that we see around us!

Disability is often overlooked in conversations about diversity, but it's integral to understanding intersectionality. A person with a disability experiences the world through a lens that combines their physical or cognitive challenges with their race, gender, or class. This intersectional experience shapes not only how they navigate society but also how society perceives them. When we fail to consider disability as a diversity, we risk ignoring an essential part of someone's identity and the unique barriers they face.

Unfortunately, the word inclusion has become synonymous only with the inclusion of people with disabilities. This narrow interpretation doesn't capture the full meaning of inclusion. My personal belief is that inclusion should be about people of all diversities - whether related to race, gender, culture, socio-economic background, or abilities - coming together, respecting and celebrating each other. Inclusion isn't about focusing on how we differ but about accepting and embracing those differences and finding common around.

Inclusion happens only when diverse individuals have a voice, and more importantly, when those voices are heard. Which means, regardless of their abilities or identities every person feels a sense of belonging and community.

True inclusion isn't a checkbox exercise - it's about fostering environments where people can be their authentic selves, without judgment, and can feel valued for who they are. It's about being conscious of the intersectional experiences of every

individual and how they are interconnected.

And most importantly inclusion can succeed only when everyone – every individual - truly understands this deep interconnectedness!
